# Community Informational

**TUCSON SECTOR BORDER PATROL -- In an effort to improve our communications within the community, we are sending you this Community Informational to inform you of significant actions taken by Border Patrol Agents in the Tucson Sector Area of Responsibility. We are excited to provide you this insight into issues that may appear in the media. We would appreciate your feedback and constructive criticism on how we can better keep you informed. Finally, feel free to forward this to others who may benefit from this information. The following is a rundown of activities that occurred over the past week within the Tucson Sector.**

### Arrests

**(AJO)** Using the Integrated Automated Fingerprint Identification System (IAFIS) Sunday, agents from the Ajo Station identified three illegal aliens as members of the Sureño and Border Brothers gangs with multiple arrests. The subjects were held for processing.

**(NGL)** Agents from the Nogales Station arrested an illegal alien Friday who admitted to membership in the Latin Kings gang. Using IAFIS, agents found arrest records for multiple violent crimes involving battery and aggravated unlawful use of a weapon, as well as marijuana convictions. The subject was held for prosecution.

**(AJO)** Agents from the Ajo Station arrested an illegal alien Thursday and ran records checks using the Integrated Automated Fingerprint Identification System (IAFIS). Records identified the man as a sex offender. He was held for prosecution.

**(NGL)** Agents from the Nogales Station apprehended a juvenile U.S. citizen Thursday with an active warrant for a traffic offense and failure to appear. The juvenile was processed and turned over to the Santa Cruz County Sheriff's Office (SCCSO).

Criminal aliens, including sex offenders, are among the dangerous individuals who attempt to enter the United States illegally. Technology, such as IAFIS, helps the Border Patrol quickly identify criminals and bring them to an appropriate law enforcement resolution.

### **Rescues and Recoveries**

(TUS) Agents assigned to the Border Patrol Search, Trauma and Rescue Unit (BORSTAR) rescued an illegal alien Monday who was vomiting and having difficulty breathing. Agents transported the subject to a local hospital.

(TUS) Agents assigned to the Border Patrol Search, Trauma and Rescue Unit (BORSTAR) discovered skeletal remains Thursday near Three Points. Agents turned the scene over to the Pima County Sheriff's Department.

Tucson Sector has more than 200 agents trained as emergency medical technicians and more than 3,200 agents ready to respond to emergency situations. Although agents in the Tucson Sector stand ready to provide humanitarian assistance to anyone encountered in need, the summer heat continues to be a threat to human health. Unfortunately, smugglers value profits more than the lives of the people they attempt to smuggle across the border. Individuals who fall ill are often left behind by smugglers and can become victims of the desert.
